# **ENTERING** 1st GRADE **SUMMER** READING **ASSIGNMENT**

Dear Parents,

Reading is fun and exciting! The summer is a great time to dive into a good book. It is important to continue to provide varied reading experiences over the summer. This will help to reinforce sight words, phonics skills, comprehension, and concepts of print.

Children and parents should spend a minimum of 15 minutes per day engaged in some type of reading experience. This would include reading to your child, with your child, or your child reading to you. When reading with your child, encourage him/her to identify and read the sight words learned in Kindergarten. Your child can use pictures or clues to help identify new words and phonics skills. Another good strategy is to ask your child questions at the end of each book to make sure he/she understands what has been read.

Please try to have your child complete 8 journal entries this summer. This works out to be one book and one journal entry per week. If you would like to complete more, go for it!

Each journal entry is a little different, so before beginning one, look through the packet and choose the entry that best suits the book your child read. Please have your child draw and write an answer for each question.

In First Grade we learn to stretch out our words like a rubber band when we spell. You can begin practicing sound spelling over the summer and encourage your child to stretch out his/her words when responding to the questions. Sound Spelling, also known as Inventive Spelling, helps your child become a more confident and comfortable writer. We do not expect your child to spell words correctly. Please send in the completed summer reading packet on the first day of First Grade. Have fun!

### Reading Response Questions

- 1. Write what happened at the beginning, middle and end of the book that you read.
- 2. Compare a character in the book you are reading to someone you know. What are the similarities and differences between them?
- 3. Did the author spark your interest? If yes, refer to parts of the book where your interest was sparked and explain how it was sparked. If not, what could you change to make the book more interesting? Explain.
- 4. Change one part of the story. Explain how it would affect the ending of the book.
- 5. Write a letter to one of the book's characters and tell him/her why you like or dislike to be that character.
- 6. Think of one decision that a character in the story made. Decide whether or not you would have made the same decision. Explain why you would have or wouldn't have made the same decision. Give specific examples to support your answer.

# \*\*\*Fifth Grade Required Reading Book\*\*\* No Talking by Andrew Clements

Dave Packer's fifth-grade classmates are so talkative and difficult to quiet down that the teachers have named them "The Unshushables." Dave has just read about Mahatma Gandhi and learned that the man practiced silence one day a week to bring order to his mind. Though Dave likes to talk nonstop, he's determined to give the idea a try. An encounter with Lyndsey, another catterbox, sparks the boys and girls into challenging each other to a no-talking contest for 48 hours. They can answer direct questions from adults with three word sentences, but must otherwise remain silent. The teachers are bewildered at the extreme change in the kids until several of them figure out what's going on. Principal Hiatt demands that the quiet students return to their normal behavior. When the children continue with their silent ways, Dave finds himself at the center of the controversy.

- Students must <u>also</u> choose one additional book to read over the summer from the attached suggested book list.
- However, I encourage students to read as much as they can over the summer.
- Students will **complete** a Reading Response Book Report for the book *No Talking* and for their second choice book as well. Please complete each Reading Response Book Report using <u>details</u>.

Responses can be typed or should be written in neat handwriting. If students read more than two books they are not required to complete any additional assignments. Be sure to bring the Reading Response Book Reports to class on the first day of school.
